Kia ora Parents.

I would like to extend to you all a warm welcome back to Hillview for Term 3. A special greeting to the new families who have joined our wonderful school community. I am confident you will feel accepted as part of our whanau very quickly. One of the special attributes of the parent community is a genuine love towards each another. It is an integral part of the culture we have enjoyed over the years.

I hope you all managed to have some quality time as a family over the last two weeks. Sadly I am aware of a number of staff, pupils, and parents who have been terribly sick with either a bad dose of a cold or severe flu. This seems to be problematic across Canterbury at the present moment. For those who are still battling with their health, we pray for you to have a speedy recovery.

The two week holiday provided an excellent opportunity for me to spend more time with the family. We stayed in Christchurch for the first week visiting various places and attended some Kid's Fest activities such as riding on a double-decker bus and Dad taking his eldest daughter for a ski lesson (Dad was rather sore at the end of the day). The second week was spent at the grandparents' farm while Dad prepared for the school term and the school production entitled OZ.

The value for this term is **EXCELLENCE** – **always striving to give our best**. It provides an excellent theme/concept/big idea to lay the platform for an integrated unit. In the next five weeks the entire school will be participating in a unit that explores the idea of what excellence is and why we should value it. The obvious context for the unit is the Olympic Games. Next Friday will be very special as we plan to run a Hillview Olympics Day for the entire school. Please feel free to come and watch the children in action.

At the risk of sounding like a broken record, I thought it would be prudent to remind us all that excellence should never be mistaken for 'elitism' or 'perfectionism'. I do not believe that God demands or requires a person to **be the best**. Instead, He asks for us to **do the best** with whatever we have, wherever we are, and to whoever we meet.

Approximately 18 months ago we ran a staff development day and part of the programme included unpacking this value of excellence. Here are five ideas that were discussed on the day:

- a) Excellence is a mind-set it is not necessarily dependent on results: a person of excellence will not always achieve a top result but the fact that they are striving to give their very best is extremely important. For instance, someone running a race could be placed 15th and be proud of their result if they had given their best. Conversely a person could do enough to win a race but come away dissatisfied with the time due to not applying themselves enough leading up to the event.
- b) Excellence does not have to be divorced from fun: There is a phrase I often hear thrown around amongst particular circles of the media when addressing sports organisation for pupils..... "it is not about winning, it is about having fun!". I would agree with half of this statement. It is important for children to enjoy their activities but I think that trying to give their best and win a

game/match is just as important and in my experience, actually promotes the enjoyment by giving meaning and purpose. I am positive that children can enjoy a sporting experience while skilfully pitting their strengths and strategies against another team/opponent.

- c) Excellence benefits other: If someone is giving their best there will be many other people who will greatly benefit. This could be fellow class pupils, fellow committee personnel, fellow team members, family, friends, and the like.
- d) Excellence has it obstacles: There can be many struggles to overcome when trying to give our best such as:
- a) Being disheartened by results
- b) Complacency don't really care
- c) Laziness can't be bothered,
- c) Mediocrity would prefer not to improve.

In each case, the battle is in the mind and how we think will determine how we behave. Overcoming these obstacles can strengthen and deepen our characters.

e) Excellence is motivated out of service for God: Ephesians 6:7 begins with "Serve wholeheartedly..." When serving God becomes my focus, it helps motivate me to give my best. He gave His very best in the sacrifice of His Son. The least I can do is do my very best for Him. It is not difficult to point out different examples of excellence within our school community and I hope to do just that over the next few newsletters. May the Lord bless you and your family as you seek to honour Him.
